#### Post 1: Impacts on Pets and Wildlife

## Did you know some of the most harmful invasive species have been introduced through the pet trade?

Goldfish, red-eared sliders, Burmese pythons and starlings— even zebra mussels on moss balls- have all been released into the wild, where they cause lasting damage to ecosystems.

Releasing a pet might feel like the kind thing to do, but most don't survive—and those that do can become invasive.

 Responsible pet ownership means doing your research and knowing what to do if you can no longer care for an animal.
There are always better options than letting it loose.

#### Post 2: Don't Let It Loose - Rehome, Don't Release

**Can't care for your pet anymore? You're not alone—and you have options.** Releasing pets into the wild might seem kind, but it can harm both the animal and the environment.

Before you consider release, explore these responsible alternatives:

- Rehome through a local rescue or shelter
- Ask friends, family, or community groups
- Consult your pet store—they may offer support or take returns
- If no other option is available, speak to a veterinarian about humane euthanasia

#### Post 3: Free Range Domestic Cats

# Domestic cats are beloved companions—but when left to roam, they can have a devastating impact on native wildlife.

Free-roaming cats in Canada kill an estimated **100–350 million birds annually**, more than any other human-related cause. They also threaten small mammals, reptiles, and even species at risk.

Most people who let their cats outside don't see the harm—but research shows that nearly **70% of cats hunt**, and their kills are concentrated in small areas, putting intense pressure on local ecosystems.

#### You can help:

- Keep your cats indoors or build a safe "catio"
- Try leash training and interactive indoor play
- ✓ Add bells or colourful collars to reduce successful hunts
- Spaying or neutering to prevent feral populations
- Protecting wildlife starts at home. Let's keep both cats and nature safe.
